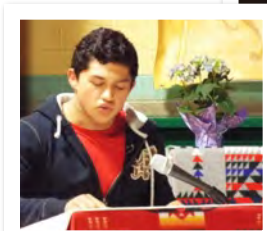

Conservation Initiative

One thing I've become acutely aware of over the past three Winters is how much it costs to heat this mission. In the past, we have spent in the neighborhood of \$14,000 annually to purchase propane for heating the mission house, the volunteer trailer, and Sister Monica's residence. Due to its poor insulation and inefficient heating system, the lion's share of that money goes to heating the mission house.

Bolstered by relative cheap propane prices and a relatively mild Winter season, we've taken some conservation measures that should result in a \$3-5,000 savings in propane expenses this year. We intend to use the surplus funds to make the mission house more efficient. First on the agenda: replacing the house's old inefficient windows with modern fixtures. Down the road, we are exploring the possibility of replacing our hot water / piped heating system with something more energy-efficient.
