Bishop Guertin Students Respond to Chinle Flooding

In late April warming temperatures accelerated the snowmelt from the above average snows that fell on the Navajo Nation during January and February. The melting waters resulted in an unusual desert flood in and near Chinle's Canyon de Chelly. On the first day of a visit by students from Nashua, New Hampshire's Bishop Guertin High School, we received a call requesting emergency assistance with filling sandbags in Chinle. The visiting students enthusiastically embraced their unexpected task and filled over 300 sandbags.

SJA Girls Help with Shearing

Girls visiting the Mission from Baton Rouge, Louisiana's St. Joseph's Academy during the first week of June were treated to an opportunity to assist a local shepherdess during shearing time. Holding sheep and bagging shorn wool were all part of the adventure.

A New Roof for the Food Pantry

The high winds that frequently blow across the Defiance Plateau wreak havoc with roofing shingles. Several years ago the Mission House and Church were re-roofed with metal panels that are far more resistant to wind damage. As years passed, additional buildings at the Mission have received metal roofing. This summer, we received finding to purchase metal roofing panels for the food pantry and tool shed. A group of benefactors is weighing the possibility of underwriting the expense of installing a metal roof on and performing other necessary repairs on the Mission's 50+ year old Hogan.
